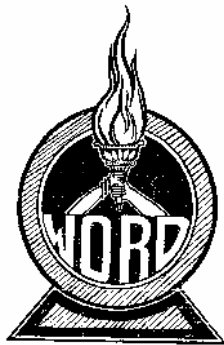

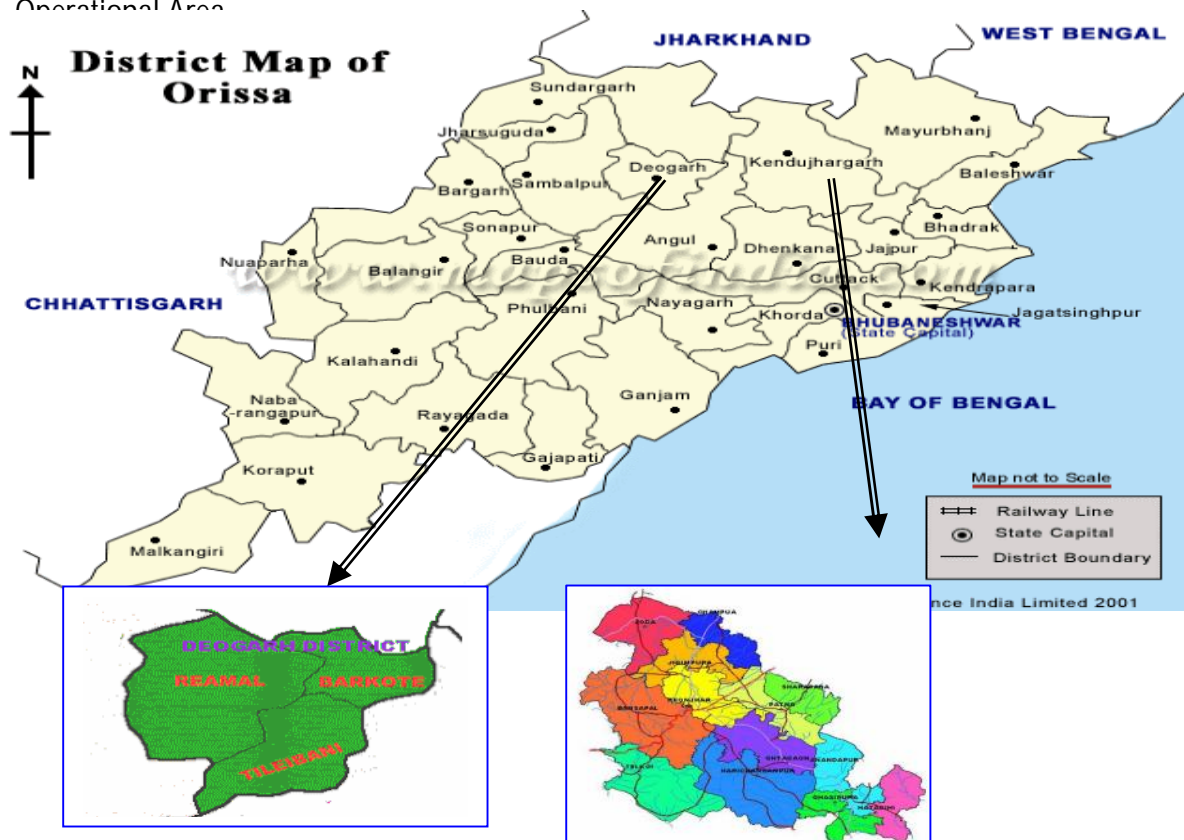

MAJOR ACTIVITIES

Women Empowerment:

The principle of gender equality is enshrined in the Indian Constitution in its Preamble, Fundamental Rights, Fundamental Duties and Directive Principles. The Constitution not only grants equality to women, but also empowers the State to adopt measures of positive discrimination in favour of women.

However, there still exists a wide gap between the goals enunciated in the Constitution, legislation, policies, plans, programmes, and related mechanisms on the one hand and the situational reality of the status of women in India, on the other.

Gender disparity manifests itself in various forms, the most obvious being the trend of continuously declining female ratio in the population in the last few decades. Social stereotyping and violence at the domestic and societal levels are some of the other manifestations. Discrimination against girl children, adolescent girls and women persists in parts of the country.



The underlying causes of gender inequality are related to social and economic structure, which is based on informal and formal norms, and practices. Consequently, the access of women particularly those belonging to weaker sections including Scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes/ Other backward Classes and minorities, majority of whom are in the rural areas and in the informal, unorganized sector – to education, health and productive resources, among others, is inadequate. Therefore, they remain largely marginalized, poor and socially excluded.

To overcome all the disparities WORD executed following activities during the year for continuing its effort for women empowerment:

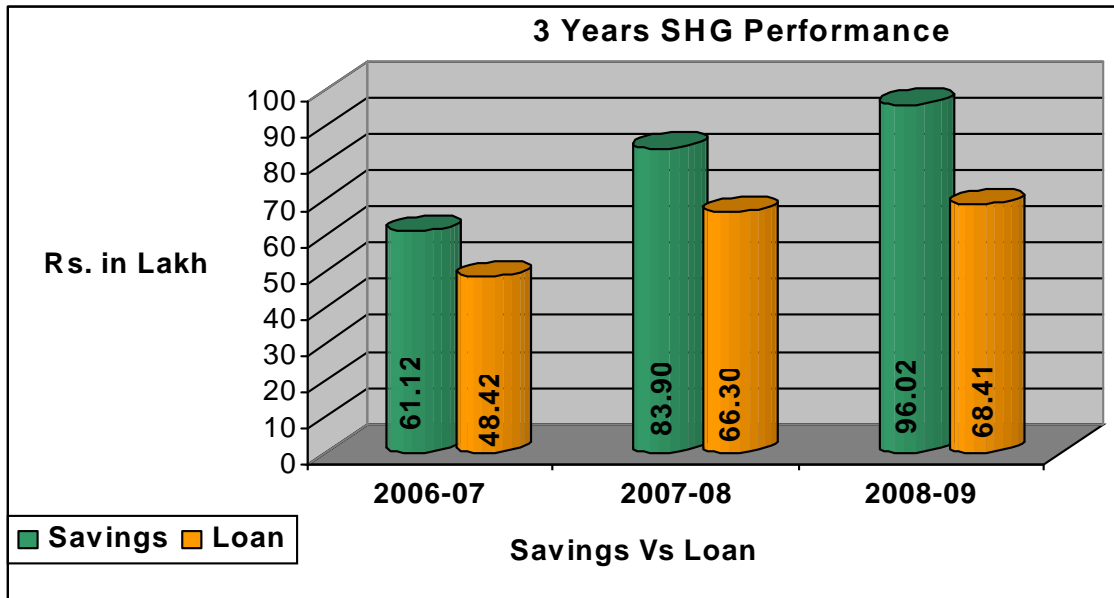

Sustainable Livelihood Actions:

WORD believes Sustainable Livelihoods Actions (SLA) are meant to improve the livelihoods of poor people. It draws on the main factors that affect poor people's livelihoods and the typical relationships between these factors. It can be used in planning new development activities and in assessing the contribution that existing activities have made to sustaining livelihoods.

The two key components of the SLA adopted by WORD are based on:

- A framework that helps in understanding the complexities of poverty in our operational area Keonjhar & Deogarh
- We set of principles to guide action to address and overcome poverty

The SL framework places people, particularly rural poor people, at the centre of a web of inter-related influences that affect how these people create a livelihood for themselves and their households. Closest to the people at the centre of the framework are the resources and livelihood assets that they have access to and use. These can include natural resources, technologies, their skills, knowledge and capacity, their health, access to education, sources of credit, or their networks of social support. The extent of their access to these assets is strongly influenced by their vulnerability context, which takes account of trends (for example, economic, political, and technological), shocks (for example, epidemics, natural disasters, civil strife) and seasonality (for example, prices, production, and employment opportunities). Access is also influenced by the prevailing social, institutional and political environment, which affects the ways in which people combine and use their assets to achieve their goals. These are their livelihood strategies.



People are the main concern, rather than the resources they use or their governments. SLA is used to identify the main constraints and opportunities faced by poor people, as expressed by themselves. It builds on these definitions, and then supports poor people as they address the constraints, or take advantage of opportunities. The framework is neither a model that aims to incorporate all the key elements of people's livelihoods, nor a universal solution. Rather, it is a means of stimulating thought and analysis, and it needs to be adapted and elaborated depending on the situation.



SLA has seven guiding principles. They do not prescribe solutions or dictate methods. Instead, they are flexible and adaptable to diverse local conditions.

The guiding principles are:

- Be people-centred. WORD begins by analyzing people's livelihoods and how they change over time. The people themselves actively participate throughout the project cycle decided action like SHG formation, credit linkage, Grain bank, Seed bank & so on
- Build on strengths. Our Activities are building on people's strengths and opportunities rather than focusing on their problems and needs. It supports existing livelihood strategies and helping them to help themselves for alternative livelihood options.
- Be dynamic. We seek to understand the dynamic nature of livelihoods and what influences them example may be taken NTFP Procurement by our users group 10/15 years back and now. Now NTFP availability reduced to a great extent. Community needs to respond to the changing situation and they are responding by alternative livelihood options facilitated by WORD.

Natural Resource Management:

Soil, water and vegetation are three basic natural resources. The survival of God's creation depends upon them and nature has provided them as assets to human beings. The management of natural resources to meet people's requirements has been practised since the pre-Vedic era. Farmers were ranked high in the social system and village management was in their hands. In order to manage land, water and vegetation, technical knowledge suitable to the specific conditions of a region was required. They gained this knowledge and developed skill through experience and learning by doing.



Over-exploitation of natural resources by growing population resulted in various severe problems. Destruction of vegetation has resulted in land degradation , denudation, soil erosion, landslides, floods, drought and unbalanced ecosystems. A balanced ecosystem is an urgent need and to have a balanced ecosystem in our operational Area different approach have been adopted .

SRI movement in Keonjhar District

Telkoi is an undulated Tribal Block of Keonjhar District. 60% of the total population is tribal. The people of the Block depend upon the Forest and Agriculture. Basically they depend on rainfall water due to lack of irrigation source.

Farmers of the Block cultivate their land with the genetic modified seed adopted by the Govt. As a subside schemes Govt have promoted to the high yielding seeds and chemical fertilizer. The practice of the farmers is high due to Govt adopted the schemes. So they use more to more chemical fertilizers every year for more production. Day to Day the fertility of land is degrading.

WORD the development organisation of the District promoted NRM activities since a decade. It has given different NRM related Training to the target people like SRI Technology, Organic manure, Wasteland development practice etc. In the year 2006-07 it had given training to 20 growing farmers on SRI Technology and Organic manure. In the same year only 3 Farmers adopted the SRI technology. The y were astonished after harvested. They harvested double of the previous year. As a result in the year 2007 -08 there were 10 farmers adopted the technology and got satisfactory results from harvest. 33 farmers were adopted the Technology with the use of local seeds in the year 2008-09 in 9.32 acres of land and harvest double from the previous year. The nearest farmers interviewed to them for their success. WORD organized a District level consultation meeting on SRI Paddy and the farmers were shared their ex perience and line department realized WORD is the first social dev elopement Organisation which is patronize the SRI in Keonjhar District.

Practice changes the livelihood by adopting SRI Technology.

Forestry:

Forest based livelihood programme being lunched in the year 2007 in 25 villages of 5 GP under 5 ranges of Keonjhar forest division but in year 2008 it had been expanded to 10 new villages with the similar partnering NGOs G.P and ranges. More especially this programme being designed to revive the degraded forest and restore the liveli hood of depends through sustainable management. Mobilizing funds and assistance from different sources to made strong of the economy under convergences.

FRA: - is provided land entitlement to the dwellers a siding in the forest areas we have facilitated to send 635 nos. of Individual claim form A and 5 nos. of Community Claim form 'B' submitted at SDLC level. We have also assisted the district administration under the same in 3 villages. As a result of it 255 nos. of dwellers enable to avail entitlement from Aluni, Oriya and Gundurijoda.

Agro forestry: - Shorted out the emerging of fuel and fodder from the area lands 64 Acre and sapling such as mango, being planted the plants are grown gradually with better care.

Micro plan: - Allocated / identified the status of village resources and entrust it for the prosperity of village, we prepare 14 nos. of micro plan and it also being shared to the villagers and made a plan to put the findings in Palli Sabha.

VSS:- 30 Nos.VSS an 17nos of CFM are presently engaged in forest protection and rejuvenating degrade forest. They have raised their right over forest, collection of NTFP and marketing and plantation for livelihood security with the Support of Orissa Forest Sector Development Project & CPF.

Self Governances system:

Government have the obligation to bring up Panchayati Raj Institutions as unit of Local Self Governance as per 73rd amendment of the Constitution of India . The prime objectives of the three tier Panchayati Raj System are to eradicate poverty, uplift standard of living of people in the rural areas , bring about a healthy society by creating awareness for hygiene , sanitation and eradication of illiteracy .



THE SARAPANCH- AGENT FOR CHANGE

Manas Nayak of Halpudi village now the Sarpanch of Telkoi GP started his political carrier from 1994, when was elected at the age of 26. After a decade he is consecutive 3rd time elected as missionary of change. He is leading the Telkoi Vikash Parishad, an apolitical Forum of PRIs' of Telkoi Block. As a Convenor, he has organized the GP level PRI leaders for Progressive Socio economic and political empowerment of the tribal people. The Forum was conceptualized and promoted by WORD. It has fought for common minimum needs, Social Security measures for innocent primitive & Tribal populace. It may be road connectivity, safe drinking water, quality primary Education especially girl children, School infrastructure, streamlining PDS, Afforestation, regeneration & restoration, SHG Credit movement, Patta land rights for landless Abhijan, Crop irrigation etc.

Health & Nutrition issues were closely interacted several times at Forum level. The Forum has taken strong steps in demanding Sector Medical Officer of Rainsuan & Kaliahata PHCs and have been successful in getting the doctors.

3 HW(F) have been residential in Oriya, Akul & Bhimkand S/C's due to the able leadership and demand generation by the Forum.

Manas has started Motivation the AWWs for regular NHD and time complete immunization coverage through Forum members. 14 PRI leaders in 14 GPs regularly monitor the Immunization (RI) session at IPS.

The result has impressed other GP functionaries to be involved in mass Immunization Campaign. Manas is a harbinger of healthy behaviour practices at traditional households on safe Institutional delivery.

Health:

WORD recognize that in order to further improve maternal and newborn health by reducing mortality and morbidity related to pregnancy and child birth, it is essential to build continuum of care that increases access to and use of skilled care during pregnancy, birth and the post partum period. The continuum of care need to extend from care in the household to the care provided by a skilled health professional at the primary care level, to that provided at the referral facility for those women and newborns with complications. Having a pool of skilled manpower for provision for this continuum of care is a major challenge for India towards improving its maternal health situation.

We in WORD works for following key component to improve Child Health

- ✓ Essential newborn care (Breast feeding, warmth, Hygiene, cord care and recognition of danger signs)
- ✓ Pregnancy and childbirth are safe for all women and their infants are born alive and healthy
- ✓ Immunization
- ✓ Skilled care at and after birth
- ✓ Control of diarrhoeal diseases and ARI
- ✓ Breastfeeding and complementary feeding

WORD in association with District Health Administration & Care-India is working at Banspal, Telkoi Block to improve Nutrition & Health service access by communities . At Joda Block with the support from OSACS is working on Reducing High Risk Behaviour and our achievement for the year cited in the table.

- Level Advisory Committee Meeting with CDPO, MO I/C & their Block level supervisory staffs.
- PRIS have been provided series of Orientations in 2 Blocks to have conceptual clarity & understanding key critical H&N issues & gaps and Jointly Plan for quality improvement.
- A Demonstrative herbal Plantation developed in 2 acres of land covering 1783 nos. plants of 37 varieties.

EDUCATION:

Education is the principal instrument of developing human capabilities that provides the instruments for liberation from ignorance and oppression. It is both the cause and effect of development

WORD took stock of parameters like infrastructure, learning climate, children's and teachers' perspective and involvement of the family and the community at large, difficulties on the part of teachers in addressing the learning requirements of children with special needs, and bringing convergence between the home language and the school language. It identified the loopholes and shortcomings in the system and recommended a set of measures to achieve the goal of Universal Elementary Education (UEE).



Throughout its involvement in the primary education programme, the effort of WORD is to get all children into schools including non-starters and dropouts. The approach of the organization has always been therefore to strengthen the various initiatives of the government agencies in this direction.

While WORD is engaged in an effort to experiment and innovate on quality education front in a micro way, there is a significant effort to extensively enhance enrolment and quality in schools through building partnership with all possible stake holders.

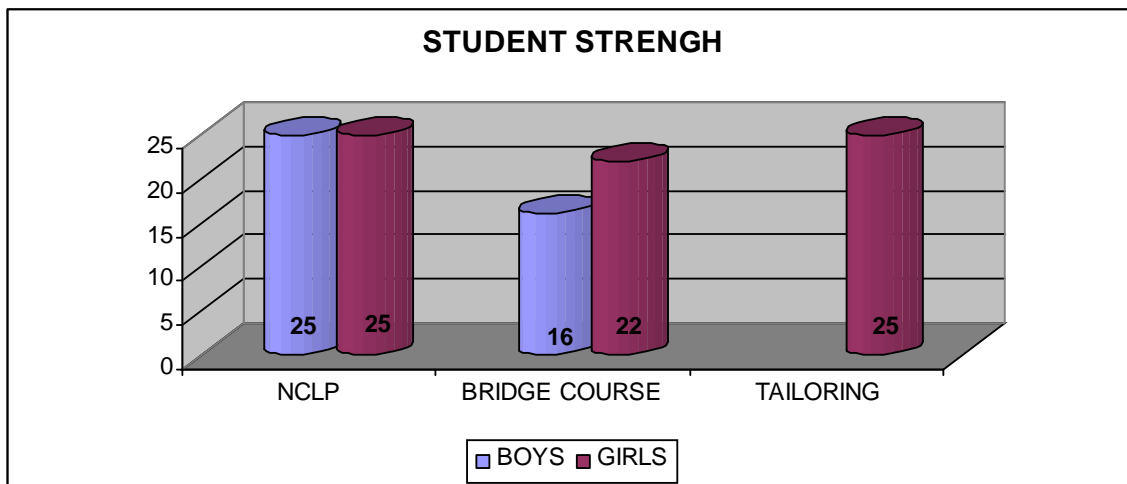
WORD intervenes in the theme of primary education with the following objectives: -

- Ensure free and compulsory elementary education to all children in the operational areas within the age group of 6-14 through the formal schools or non-formal educational programs.
- Enhance the quality of primary education in the formal as well as in the non-formal sector through appropriate interventions like capacity building, infrastructure etc., and also by influencing policy through research, lobby and advocacy as well as by proper networking.



- Enhance the capacities of the grass root level intermediary organizations, facilitators, village education committee and other civic groups etc. on universalisation of elementary education.
- Ensure quality education through monitoring forums and prepare advocacy agenda after careful analysis of the educational policies and schemes

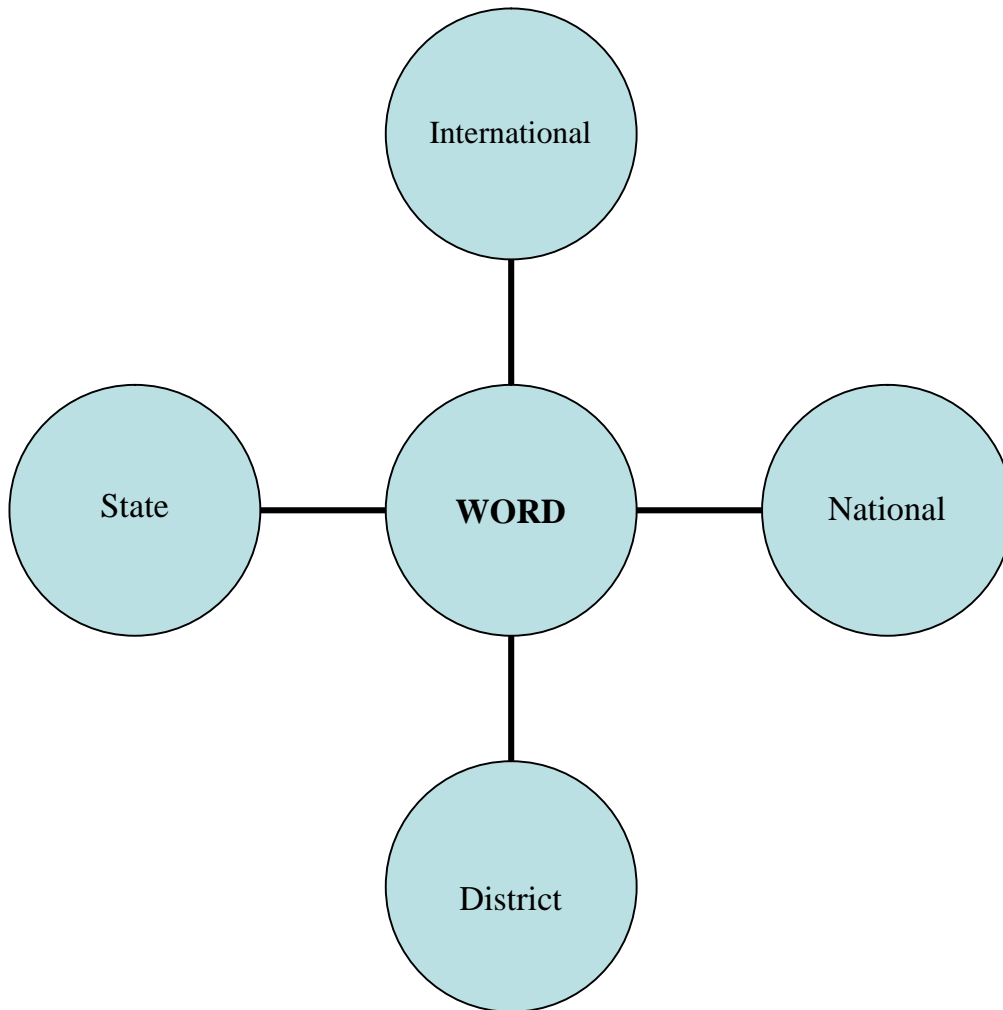

Through various networks, it has enabled grassroot organisations to deliberate on common issues and have a sharing of experiences to build up solidarity. In the whole process the outcomes are:

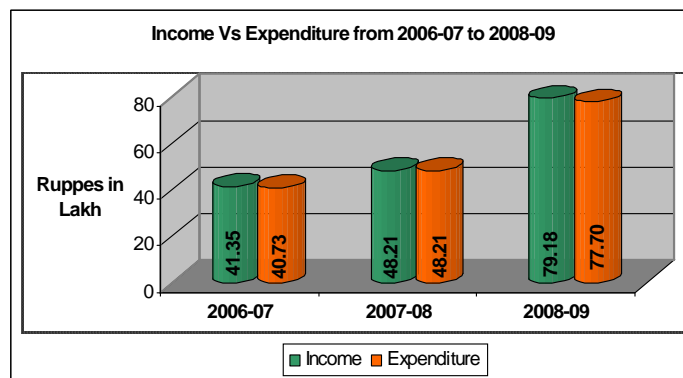
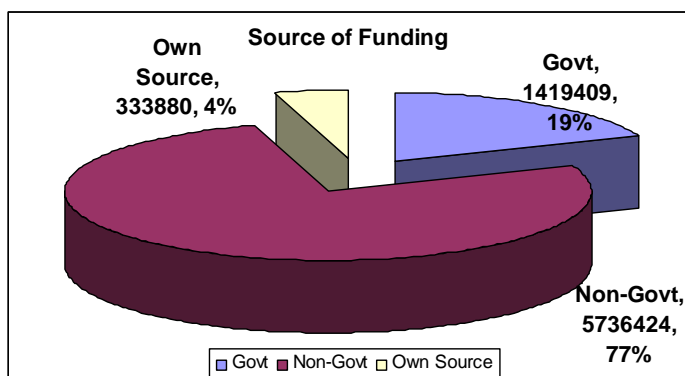
1. People's participation in mainstream political process has increased.
